Pastoral Letter

March 2011

Dear Friends,

Last week I was showing off St Mary's. We are so fortunate to have a lovely sanctuary and I enjoy showing people the various contributions made by individuals and artists throughout many years. In the Easter Window, which was installed by Rev Haughton in memory of his late wife Peggy, there is a powerful image of the agony of the Garden of Gethsemane. The window was designed by Willie Roger, installed by Willie and John Clark. One image within the window is that of a figure in torment, head in hands. The image my guest suggested was very reminiscent of a painting by the Norwegian Edvard Munch called *Scream*. Munch painted it in 1893 and wrote in his diary;

'I was walking along a path with two friends. The sun was setting. I felt a breath of melancholy. Suddenly the sky turned blood red. I stopped, and leant against the railing, deathly tired: looking out across flaming clouds, that hung like blood and a sword over the deep blue fjord and town. My friends walked on. I stood there trembling with anxiety and felt a great infinite scream through nature'

Munch painted what he felt, saw and heard. It is a really difficult picture to look at and some may even find it disturbing. The mood created, the colours used and the expression witnessed in the painting may be a challenge. You would not want to have this picture up in your bedroom or living room it may 'chill your mood' as your day unfolds.

In the book of the prophet Isaiah within the Old Testament you can read these words; ***'The voice said 'Cry!' And I said: 'What shall I cry?' All flesh is grass.***


As we move through life there are times when we encounter people who need to 'Cry!' Sometimes we may need to 'Cry!' The 'Cry!' may arise out of things seen, experiences remembered, events in life. However sometimes the 'Cry!' comes when we enter into the pain of another. We see starvation, homelessness, ill treatment of children, Civil unrest, tyrannical leaders or natural disasters.

Although church can sometimes seem disconnected from everyday life I think in worship we are meant to 'Cry!

Sometimes we enter into the pain of another or we cry out at the injustice.

Whenever I look at the Easter window I will try to remember that Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane 'Cried out!' for all who suffer. We should be thankful for all who scream, shriek and cry – in words, paintings, stained glass or music – to awaken us from our slumber to unstop our deaf ears and hear the ***'Cry!'***

Communion

The Session held a special session meeting in October to discuss issues pertaining to the method of distribution of the elements (common cup vs. individual cups), to the involvement of young people in Communion and whether we should reintroduce communion cards. At our Special Session meeting on 9th February, the Session met to consider the following proposals that Mark put forward on the basis of the discussions that took place in October. The proposals were:-

Distribution of Elements

That we increase the frequency of Communion services from 2 to 4 in the year. Two of the Communion services would continue to be celebrated by the traditional method of the common cup. At the additional services we would use individual glasses and non alcoholic wine.

Young people and their participation at Communion

That any young person who was deemed to be appropriately mature and prepared could take Communion. The appropriate Elder in consultation with the child's carer and the Minister would make the preparation and instruction available to the young person before he / she would be allowed Communion.

Communion Cards

That we do not re-introduce Communion cards, but we look at how we might better use current means of communication to inform folks of forthcoming Communion services.

The various proposals were accepted by Session after discussion and the Communion Committee have been tasked with arranging the additional communion services.

Mark is grateful for the thoughtful participation of Elders in this discussion.

Climate Change: What you can do

Over the next few months we shall be making some suggestions for members of the congregation to consider as their personal response to climate change. This month we are looking at heating in the home:

The aim is to reduce CO2 emissions through better insulation, targeting our heating where it is really needed, looking at more efficient boilers and more effective monitoring.

First carry out an audit of what energy you are using in your home and whether the heating is used appropriately. For example, is the heating on in rooms no one is using? Something as simple as thermostatic valves on each radiator if you don't already have them could save pounds in fuel bills.

Second, is there any scope for improving insulation and reducing drafts? If you have radiators, then putting aluminium foil behind the radiator reflects the heat back into the room rather than heating the wall. Simple, cheap and effective double glazing is a possibility if you don't already have it.

Third, if your boiler is at the end of its useful life and you are thinking of replacing it there are some alternatives you might like to think about:

- Condensing boilers are much more efficient than ordinary gas boilers – and there's help to fund them: see the Big green boiler scheme at <http://www.green-boilers.co.uk/>
- A small scale wind or solar tile construction could provide some of your energy needs thus reducing your bills over a period of time. There are a number of suppliers who would advise you depending on where you live.

Fourth, turn down your thermostat by 1 degree.

Ministries and Mission Contributions 2011

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Thank you for supporting the worship, mission and service of the Church through the money you give in your offering. It is important that you know what happens to this money. This letter tells you about your congregation's Ministries and Mission Contribution – the money your Congregational Treasurer sends to the Church Offices in Edinburgh. How does it enable the worship, mission and service of the Church?

The information below shows how your congregation's contribution is used to support Parish Ministries, Mission and Renewal, and general support and services provided for congregations and the councils of the General Assembly. Please note that the cost of your minister is now what he/she is paid. This cost is the total for stipend and employer's national insurance and pension contributions, and is based on a minister with ten year's service

This supports the Church's work in resourcing congregations for Christian education and outreach, in caring for vulnerable in society, in partnership with Church in some of the poorest parts of the world, and in providing a Christian perspective on the issues of today.

Support and Services for Councils and Congregations (8%)

This provides financial, legal safeguarding and other services, and meets the cost of the General Assembly and the Moderator.

Please note that Ministries and Mission Contributions only provide part of the total funding required for the work of the Church listed above. A fuller picture is given in the leaflet 2011 Ministries and Mission, which is available free to all congregations.

I hope that this helps you to understand Ministries and Mission Contributions and shows you are enabling the sharing of the gospel through the money your congregation sends through the Church Offices to all parts of Scotland and beyond.

Gift Aid

Having recently completed the claim for the nine months to 31 December, 2010 it brought to mind the fact that the amount which we are able to reclaim with effect from 6 April 2011 will only be 25p for each pound compared to the present rate of 28p. This will clearly have a pronounced effect on our income for future years. Indeed, based on the recoveries for the last calendar year, we will lose some £3,000 which is equivalent to the costs incurred for Organ Upkeep and Outreach Costs.

In order to meet this shortfall it would be helpful if anyone who pays tax in any way and is not a member of the Gift Aid scheme joins as soon as possible; remember it costs you nothing to join and there is no set commitment. We are able to go back only four years now to reclaim on past giving as opposed to six, therefore with the end of the tax year looming it is all the more important to join now. In these difficult times it is not easy to ask for more, but if you can make up the 3p difference or more it would be appreciated. Gift Aid Forms are available in the vestibule and should be returned to John Thomson or myself. Either of us are happy to answer any questions which you may have.

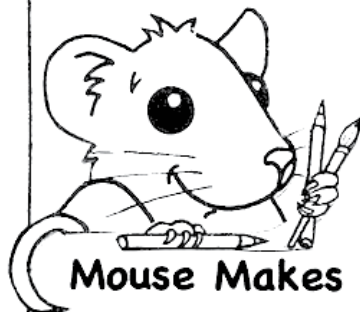

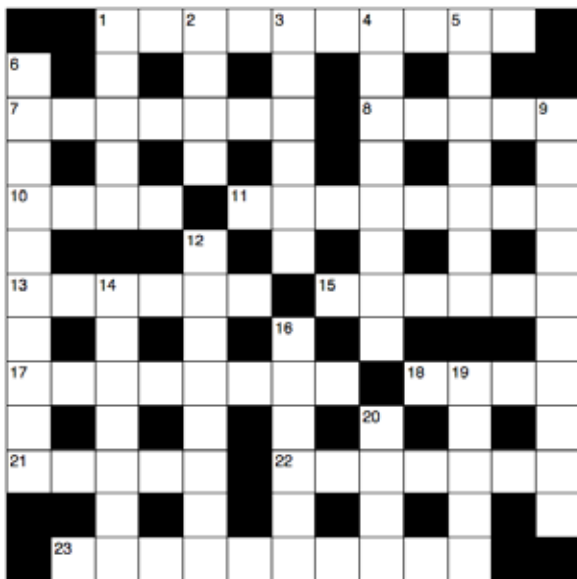

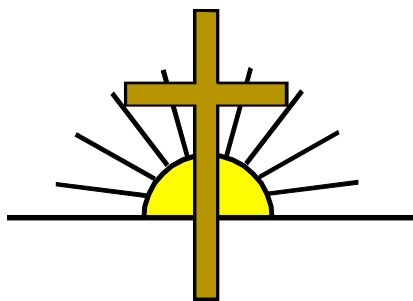

On 18th February 1678, one of the most famous Christian books was published for the first time. It was 'The Pilgrim's Progress' by John Bunyan. The book tells the story of a character called Christian who travels towards the heavenly city, encountering many difficulties and getting led astray, but finally succeeding.
